RUNNYMEDE SPORTS.

The initial meeting of the Runnymede Athletic Clubs sports was, held in Mrs Montgomery's paddock, Runnymede, on Saturday afternoon, the 19th in fine weather, and was an unqualified success. In spite of a busy time-harvesting is in full swing, in the outlying northern districts in particular-the attendance was very good, fully 150 people being present. An exceedingly good days sport was provided, and the entries for each event were very satisfactory. The arrangements were well carried out, and the events run off with comfortable promptitude. Owing to such a lengthy programme the hack race had to be eliminated. Great interest was shown throughout the proceedings. The scene, particularly in the immediate foreground, was an animated and beautiful one, the healthy glow and smiling faces of the younger folk as they greeted each and every friend and acquaintance, the happy and contented faces of the elders; whilst the various coloured hats and pretty dresses of the ladies added considerable lustre to the view.

To the north-west, Mount Brown loomed large and dark in the distance, whilst on every side except to the north east, where Mrs Montgomery's residence stands over the main road on a small eminence green timber (which furnished a pleasing background to the sports ground. From the bush came the occasional cry of some feathered songster., but, as though some instinctive reasoning (or maybe it was that the birds had been disturbed) by the merry sporting company told them that their melodies were as nought to the importance of the occasion, then cries lacked the true spirit, and gradually melted away, as it were.

But I digress Chief interest centred on the Handicap Chop which brought out seven axemen. It was well contested by the three scratchmen- Leslie Cornish, Tom Rowlands and Wat McConnon. Cornish won by about two blows from Rowland, McConnon being a few seconds away. Everything passed off smoothly and the management of the meeting was efficiently carried out, reflecting great credit on those concerned.

The arrangements were in the hands of the following officials -Committee, Mrs Win Wright (president) Messrs A Wright, Roy Johnson, G Phipps, Mrs Blacklow and the Misses B Montgomery and M. Wright, handicapper and starter, W E Iles, judges, Messrs G Wright and James Montgomery, secretary and treasurer, Misses G and M Lane respectively.

Mr C J Lane officiated on behalf of his daughter during the sports gathering. The management had two booths on the fringe of the sports ground a cordial and sweet stall booth in conjunction, presided over by Mr. W. Wright and his daughter (Miss M. Wright) respectively, and a refreshment booth, under the charge of Mesdames Wm. Wright and Blacklow and Miss B. Montgomery.

The details of the racing in the various events were as follow:

Maiden Race, 120yds.-A. Kelly (Rich- mond) 1, F. Blacklow 2, H. Ewart 3.

Sheffield Handicap, 130yds.-M. Mont- gomery 1. -F. Blacklow 2, L. Downham 3. Won easily.

Quarter-mile.-F. Blacklow 1, M. Mont- gomery 2, J. Downham 3. Blacklow quickly assumed the lead, and was never headed, although Montgomery came with a great sprint about 50 yards from the tape, and passed into second place, with which he appeared to be content.

Mile Race.-Fred. Blacklow, 65 yards, W. McConnon, 65yards, 2; J. Down- ham, 65 yards, 3. This was a magnificent race, for which seven competed. McConnon quickly took up the running, and led nearly the whole of the way. However, Blacklow (who seems cut out for a long- distance runner, having splendid stamina and endurance who,

lying handy at third place till within 50 yards from home, when he surprised the spectators by a wonderful sprint, and, passing the second man (Downham), drew level with McConnon, who responded gamely. Amidst tremendous excitement these, two raced for ten yards together, but, after having all the honours of the race up to this time, McConnon had to succumb to a promising miler in Blacklow, who won by about nine or ten yards. McConnon was palpably distressed at the finish. Downham was not far away for third race. The three placed men were virtually on the scratch mark.

Handicap Chop, through lying logs 42} inches in girth.-L Cornish, scratch, 1

T. Rowlands, scratch, 2; W. McConnon scratch, 3. The three placed men had all, or nearly all, the following, and as the pride of place diverted into a battle royal, the shouts of their immediate partisans waxed strong. It was a great finish between Cornish and Rowlands. Time, 1min. 7sec.

FAILURE TO BRAND SHEEP

Charge at Launceston

The necessity of sheep being branded with the new owner's brand immediately they were purchased was urged by Sergeant R. H. Westell in the Launceston Police Court yesterday, when prosecuting in a case in which Harold Henry Ewart was charged with having failed to brand 13 ewes as required under the Stock Act. Ewart did not appear, and the case was heard ex parte by the Police Magistrate (Mr. F. N. Stops) and Messrs. W. H. Daymond and J. Couch, J.P.

Trooper Johnson stated that on April 7 Ewart purchased 103 sheep branded "JWC" at the Evandale sale. On April 25 he reported that about 13 of the sheep were missing.

When witness visited defendant's property at Prosser's Forest on August 4 he found 13 ewes in a paddock near the house, and the only brand they carried was "JWC." Defendant explained that he intended to resell the sheep, and did not think it was necessary to put his brand on them.

Sergeant Westell said the case had been brought forward at the request of the stock authorities. A fine of £1, with 0/ costs, was imposed.
